Marty Taylor - Think Aloud Protocols: Leveraging Our Sign Language Interpreting Practice

Marty discusses how "knowledge-lean" and "knowledgerich" metacognitive skills demonstrated through Think Aloud Protocols may be used as strategies for leveraging sign language interpreting practice.

Pamela Collins - Paradigm Shift: Scheduling as a Frontline Steward of Sign Language Interpreting

The needs of communities served by interpreters continue to grow. Learning more about the everyday scheduling experiences of both interpreters and interpreter schedulers might help to better tailor scheduling tasks to address the needs of both, ultimately serving clients more effectively.

In this highly interactive session, participants will learn how to transform any feedback confrontation into a meaningful and constructive conversation.
